AUSTRALIAN CHILDHOOD VISION IMPAIRMENT REGISTER

Sue Silveira, Research Fellow Royal Institute for Deaf and Blind Children contacted the Regional Director, Carole McDiarmid about the Australian Childhood Vision Impairment Register.

This project is sponsored by the Royal Institute for Deaf and Blind Children, in partnership with children, families, eye health professionals, low vision service providers and children services. The Register aims to capture data on Australian children who live with vision impairment.

We currently have 220 children registered, including children who are blind and vision impaired.

Data from the Register is shared with researchers and in planning for better services for children.

However, children and their families are not identified in any way.

School Attendance Requirements

Regular attendance is essential to assist students to maximise their potential.

Encouraging regular attendance at school is a core school responsibility.

- Under the Education Act (1990), Parents are required to:

 ensure that children attend school every day that instruction is provided; and
 provide an explanation for absences (including late arrivals) within seven school days of the absence.

- The School has a duty of care, and will contact parents about unexplained absences by:
 sending an SMS or email message (usually on the day of the absence);
 giving students a SCHOOL REMINDER "Reason for absence note" to take home to parents (usually on the first school day following the absence);
 - sending home an 'Absentee Notice' in the mail (at least seven days after the absence); or
 - telephoning home (at any time, as required).

Please contact the school on 8088 1055 if you are concerned about your child's school attendance. School staff will work with you to address any issues and improve unsatisfactory attendance.

Where school based interventions are unsuccessful, cases of chronic non-attendance will be referred to the regional Home School Liaison Program. The Department can undertake legal action in the case of parents who do not fulfil their obligations under the Education Act (1990) despite all reasonable measures being taken by school and regional staff to support them.
